Celebrating Black History Month - February

Black History Month Course: excerpts from *The 1619 Project*

Sunday mornings at 11 am in the Family Room Running 4 consecutive weeks, from February 2 to February 23 Led by Adult Education Committee

Our Black History month course curriculum will rely heavily on the August 18, 2019 issue of the *New York Times Magazine* called *The 1619 Project*. The living artists, writers and scholars who contributed to this magazine issue and broader project will receive the primary focus and place of honor as our course teachers. We will take time each Sunday morning class time to appreciate, in general, their broader life work, but also the courage and care they offered in wrestling with a particular topic or event of US Black history to make their individual contribution to the Project.

The course will be designed to provide introductory engagement with representative portions of this project each Sunday morning in February, with longer reading/study/response assignments for course enrollees to work on through the week for an hour or two as they opt in. This Project includes a 100-page issue with 35 contributing artists, writers, and scholars. It has 17 literary pieces, 11 essays, and 6 brief historical inserts. There's also podcast titled *1619*, with episodes that connect to several of the essays. Black History Month Book Study: Lenny Duncan's *Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the US*

Running 4 consecutive weeks from February 5 through February 26

The black preacher and author is Lenny Duncan. The whitest denomination is the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Duncan is now an ELCA pastor. But his often reckless youth and young adulthood would have predicted him ending up otherwise. One reviewer of *Dear Church* writes: "Duncan brings the truth about being black in the whitest church in the USA, about being queer in a queerphobic context, about the stigma brought against formerly incarcerated folk. Lenny reminds the church of our call from God to be church not just for the margins, or to the margins, but recentering ourselves in the margins." If you're up for a challenging read that generates compelling conversation, this may very well be the study you're looking for.

Discovery Book Club novel: Women Talking by Miriam Toews

Women Talking is based on the true story of 130 Mennonite women and children in Bolivia who were drugged and raped for four years and had been told that ghosts had attacked them. Toews turns their story into a

propulsive novel showing how eight women in the colony might have reacted. As they were all illiterate, their story is narrated by a shunned man who keeps "minutes" of their conversations. This is an original and fierce manifesto that reveals itself in an irresistible story that it's tempting to read in one sitting.

Discovery Book Club novel: Other Words for Home by Jasmine Warga

Other Words for Home is an exquisite view of the immigrant experience as seen through Jude, an eleven-year-old Syrian girl who accompanies her pregnant mother to live in Cincinnati. Told in verse, Jude makes being "other" come alive through her heart and her hope-filled story.
